

# Asphalt Paving, Roofing Materials, and Lubricant Manufacturing Fact Sheet #1 -- Storm Water Notice of Intent

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## Asphalt Paving, Roofing Materials, and Lubricant Manufacturing and the Storm Water Program

Through the Arizona Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (AZPDES) program, the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality (ADEQ) has established requirements for controlling storm water discharges that could adversely affect the quality of rivers, washes, and water bodies in Arizona. Even though many of the waterways in Pima County are dry streambeds during most of the year, the rules are also intended to protect our desert environment.

Of the many industrial categories that must obtain storm water coverage, the federal government has identified those businesses involved in the manufacturing of asphalt paving, roofing materials, and lubricants. This industrial sector includes the following Industry Groups, with the associated Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes.

### Asphalt Paving and Roofing Materials:

- SIC 2951 — Asphalt Paving Mixtures and Blocks
- SIC 2952 — Asphalt Felts and Coatings

### Miscellaneous Products of Petroleum and Coal:

- SIC 2992 — Lubricating Oils and Greases
- SIC 2999 — Products of Petroleum and Coal, Not Elsewhere Classified

Permittees under Sector D are primarily engaged in the following types of activities:

- Manufacturing asphalt paving and roofing materials;
- Operating portable asphalt plant facilities; or
- Manufacturing lubricating oils and greases.



**NOTE:** The following storm water discharges are NOT authorized under this program:

- Discharges from petroleum refining facilities, including those that manufacture asphalt or asphalt products that are classified as SIC Code 2911 [Petroleum Refining]; or
- Discharges from oil recycling facilities; or
- Discharges associated with fats and oils rendering.

## Notice of Intent (NOI) to Discharge Storm Water

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) "National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Storm Water Multi-Sector General Permit" [MSGP-2000](#) expired on Oct. 30, 2005. In December 2005, EPA proposed a replacement permit for the MSGP-2000. This replacement permit was identified as the Proposed [MSGP-2006](#). Although EPA has not yet issued the replacement permit, facilities should become familiar with the requirements in the Proposed MSGP-2006.

Facilities with coverage under the MSGP-2000 prior to its expiration have been granted an administrative continuance. Those facilities already covered under the MSGP-2000 must continue to implement their storm water pollution prevention plans (SWPPPs) and comply with the requirements in the MSGP-2000. The administrative continuance will remain in effect until a new permit is issued by EPA.



Facilities that did not have coverage under the MSGP-2000 prior to permit expiration will not have permit coverage available until the new MSGP permit is issued. As a result, neither EPA nor ADEQ are accepting Notices of Intent (NOIs)\*\* from facilities that do not have permit coverage.

ADEQ is following EPA's lead regarding enforcement of facilities that do not have coverage under the MSGP-2000. Facility operators may refer to EPA's October 31, 2006 [MSGP Enforcement Memorandum](#) as a reference on how ADEQ will likely proceed during the interim period before the Proposed MSGP-2006 is issued final. Operators of these facilities must still develop and implement storm water pollution prevention plans, best management practices, and the appropriate sector-specific requirements as described in the MSGP-2000.
